Difficult/unusual/confusing junctions	Instructors must familiarise themselves with the area to be used			
- •	before training begins. Identify any parts that are too challenging and			
	avoid them. For other difficult sections ensure only pupils with			
	adequate skills and confidence ride them and that they are briefed on			
	the best approach.			
Busy/fast roads	Ensure pupils are briefed before riding on these and understand how			
	they affect decision making and manoeuvring.			
Steep gradients	Make sure pupils are warned in advance and select appropriate gears			
	and/or control their speed.			
Kerbs/Bollards/Barriers	Brief pupils to adopt suitable road position that minimises risk of			
	collision.			
Rough/poor surfaces/traffic calming	Ensure pupils are warned in advance to reduce the risk of sudden			
	braking or steering			
Parked vehicles	Instructors to teach and the pupils to practice safe overtaking on a			
	quiet section of road before they attempt junctions or more

#### GENERAL NOTES

The lanes in this area are generally narrow with undulating and twisting sections that limit views. Not many junctions along them are well marked. The B4077 is even more hilly around Ford and national speed limit outside the village making it a big step up for pupils. They will need to have consistently demonstrated all outcomes before riding along this road and particularly before doing right turns off it.

ANY OTHER SPECIFIC HAZARD (see map)	ACTION TO BE TAKEN
1. The approach to the give way is quite narrow and uphill with walls leaving no step off area. Also the view towards Kineton is restricted by a bend.	Turns out from here only to be ridden by pupils who have previously demonstrated sufficient ability and control up such gradients.  Instructors to discuss with pupils the need for extra care with observations before right turns here.
2. Crossroads with significant gradients on all approaches. The main road is not very wide and has limited step offs due to high verges and hedges.	Instructors to discuss with pupils the implications for traffic movements and the extra care with observations required. Pupils will need to have demonstrated good braking judgement and control and exercises must be planned with no need to stop on this section of the main road. Ridden major/minor rights will be challenging at L2 and not suitable for pedestrian alternative.
3. Steep hills down into Ford from both directions with sharp bends and no footways.	Instructors to ensure pupils control their speed on their way into the village and only to be ridden by pupils who have previously demonstrated sufficient ability and control up such gradients.
4. Junctions at crossroads. At B4077 the views towards Ford are restricted by brow of hill.	Instructors to discuss with pupils the implications for traffic movements and the extra care with observations required.
5. The B4077 between here and Ford can have fast traffic and bends hill brows restrict views in places.	Only pupils who have demonstrated good confidence, control and an understanding of road position to ride here. Ridden major/minor rights will be too challenging at L2.
6. Building on corner restricts view	Instructors to discuss with pupils and ensure they take sufficient time and care before turns out.
